COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Survey of painting, sculpture, architecture, and minor arts from prehistoric times through the 14th century.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE:

ARTS 1303, Art History I, partially satisfies the requirements for the Associate Degree at Clarendon College and is designed for transfer to a senior college or university. The acceptance and application of this course to a four year degree is determined by the receiving institution, not Clarendon College.

EXEMPLARY OBJECTIVES:

1. To demonstrate awareness of the scope and variety of works in the arts.
2. To understand those works as expressions of individual and human values within an historical and social context.
3. To respond critically to works in the arts.
4. To engage creative process and understand the physical and intellectual demands required of the artist.
5. To articulate an informed personal reaction to works in the arts.
6. To develop an appreciation for the aesthetic principles that guide or govern the arts.
7. To demonstrate knowledge of the influence of the arts or intercultural experiences.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of this course, you shall:

1. Define and use various terms relevant to the course.
2. Understand works of art in a cultural, historical and religious context.
3. Understand mediums, elements and ideas contained in works from all periods.
4. Describe how particular works are direct responses to the historical and environmental factors which form their cultural context.
5. Understand the ways in which art is a fundamental human activity in any time or place.

METHODS OF INSTRUCTION:

Learning activities will include lecture; video/DVD; demonstrations; class discussions; readings.

CLASS POLICIES:

(Plagiarism is the using, stating, offering or reporting as one's own, an idea, expression, or production of another person without proper credit.) Plagiarism is considered serious academic misconduct. All speeches and critiques presented should be the work of the student enrolled in the course. Proper documentation should be made of materials cited from all sources. Instructors determining that a student has plagiarized a speech or paper or cheated on a test will assign a failing grade for that course and may elect to pursue disciplinary proceedings against the student.
3. Students are responsible for all college regulations as stated in the Clarendon College student publications available in the administration office.
4. If you stop attending class, but do not officially withdraw or drop, your name remains on the roll. You will be issued a grade on the work completed. **Last day to withdraw with a W is November 12, 2010.**
