COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Interpersonal communications 1318 is a study of the psychological, physical, and cultural barriers to interpersonal communication with an emphasis on overcoming these barriers in order to improve interpersonal communication.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE:

Interpersonal Communications partially satisfies the requirements for the Associate Degree at Clarendon College and is designed for transfer to a senior college or university.

4. Participate effectively in groups with emphasis on listening, critical and reflective thinking, and responding.
5. Understand and apply basic principles of critical thinking, problem solving, and technical proficiency in the development of exposition and argument.
6. Develop the ability to research and write a documented paper and/or to give an oral presentation.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES: The learner shall:

1. The learner shall formulate and compare interpersonal conflicts.
2. Create, organize, support and present public and/or group presentations.
3. Prepare appropriate topics for public and/or group presentations.
4. Predict and select motivation factors in the communication process.
5. Select the appropriate verbal and nonverbal delivery skills for public and/or group presentations.
6. Assess, compare and support individual views of communication processes and conflicts.
7. Assess, and choose appropriate responses to public and/or group communication situations.
8. Effectively argue and support points of view on a variety of subjects.

METHODS OF INSTRUCTION:

Learning activities will be online and include; discussions, projects, readings, and relationship journals.

REQUIRED ASSIGNMENTS:

1. **Tests:** There will be 5 tests and a final. The 5 tests will consist of 25 objective questions and the final will consist of 50 objective questions. Whenever there is a test due, click on the "Tests" icon on the homepage and take the appropriate test. The tests are timed. You will have 30 minutes to take each test and 60 minutes to take the final. Each test is worth a total of 10 percent of your total grade. The test will cover information from your textbook so be sure to be familiar with the text before taking the quiz. Remember, once you start the test you will not be able to stop the timer, so make sure you're ready to begin. Good luck!! Your tests will be open for one week. If you do not take your test during that time period, you will receive a zero. Do not wait until the last minute. Take into account technology issues. I do not accept late work.
2. **Discussions:** You are required to post to the discussion board and respond to others' posts throughout the semester. This is a significant part of your grade (20%). Begin with the "Getting to Know You" prompt. I will then post a prompt for each chapter in your book, 15 total. You will need to post a response to my prompt on the discussion board and respond to at least one other person's post for each chapter (30 total responses). Responses to others' posting should include more than just "I agree" or "I disagree" they should include things like: 1. Your personal perspective on your classmate's original post. 2. Why you agree or disagree with what they've stated. 3. Your personal, professional or academic experienced that caused you to respond the way you've responded and/or use an example from the text. **All 30 response grades will be averaged together for the Discussion portion of your grade. Discussion boards may not be made up or turned in late.** You will find a link to the discussion board on the homepage. Learning for this course is both theoretical and experimental. In order for this course to meet its objectives, everyone is responsible for contributing meaningfully. This also means reading assigned materials, coming prepared to engage in discussions and completing assignments on time. Both the quality and quantity of your contributions count. So put some time into your discussions, tell us about your thoughts, values, experiences and beliefs. We will learn from each other. Quality discussions are worth 20% of your grade.

3. **Projects:** Students will be asked to complete various exercises throughout the semester. This is a significant part of your grade (20%). These will be listed in the weekly assignments section on the homepage. Complete the exercises and submit them to the drop box on or before the due date. **All 14 project grades will be averaged together for the Project portion of your grade. Projects may not be made up or turned in late.**
4. **Extra credit:** Extra credit will be listed in the weekly assignments section on the homepage. **It is due before 9PM on December 4.** Depending on the quality of your work, you can receive up to 3 points to your final grade.
